Executive Summary

The Global Surgical Consortium (GSC) is a 501c3 public charity that was created in 2010 to address the growing global surgical and anesthesia crisis and to provide sustainable solutions appropriate for low income countries (LICs) where surgical disease is increasing and few services exist for surgical treatment.

In 2011, the GSC focused on establishing The Global Surgical Index; an interactive database that describes the current state of existing needs and resources in the global surgical theater. This database will be the first comprehensive assessment of this kind. A surgical survey has been designed and is currently being implemented in the 85 countries defined as low income by the World Bank. Information gathered via this survey is continuously incorporated into the Global Surgical Index (GSI), and is accessible online to any interested individual or organization.

In 2011, 6 countries were completely surveyed, and the data collected allowed for creation of the hoped for comparative measure revealing absolute needs on a country basis, and assisting organizations in more precisely providing for the surgical and anesthesia needs of each country. This GSI has been placed on our website, wwww.globalsurgicalconsortium.org, and is available to the public and any organization hoping to optimize delivery of equipment, meds and services for safe surgery and anesthesia. The GSI will continue to expand, eventually representing all 85 low income countries in need of surgical, obstetric and anesthesia infrastructure.

Thus far, four countries in Sub Saharan Afirca were surveyed this year including Rwanda, Liberia, Uganda, and Ethiopia. Work is underway in Tanzania and Kenya, and the survey has extended to South America with the evaluation of Bolivia and is currently being completed in Bangladesh.

GSC continues to plan for the Global Surgical Exchange, an IT platform that interprets the survey data to reveal possible connections between available resources and identified needs. The Exchange will streamline collaboration, improve efficiency and enable verification of outcomes. It will transform the insights gathered through the GSI into actionable ideas for improving surgical care on the ground.

Completion of the GSI and the creation of the IT platform (GSE) will require considerable fundraising in 2012. We have extended an invitation letter to interested individuals and corporations, and it is included in this report for your review. We hope you will join us in 2012 to make surgery and safe anesthesia happen!!

Statement of Purpose

It is estimated that more than 2 billion people worldwide have no access to emergency or essential surgery and that 35 Million people receive anesthesia without the necessary safety equipment or personnel annually. With three of the leading causes of death worldwide including cardiovascular disease, trauma and cancer, this number is expected to grow. Furthermore, maternal mortality rates continue to claim more than 350,000 lives each year despite improvements in prenatal care and nutrition. A majority of these deaths are due to maternal hemorrhage and obstructed labor, both of which have surgical interventions which can save the lives of both mother and newborn. Finally, without sage anesthesia, surgical intervention may be futile. It is estimated that 35 million anesthetics are provided annually without basic safety equipment, oxygen or a qualified provider.

The global need for safe surgery and anesthesia is profound. But while the World Health Organization (WHO) records many health indicators regarding its member states, no specific information is available on numbers of surgical and anesthesia providers, numbers of functional operating theaters, availability of essential medications, nor the basic requirements to provide much needed emergency surgery – clean water, sterilization equipment, electricity, or a sage blood supply.

The Global Surgical Consortium (GSC) has been established to support US based organizations and institutions working to build surgical and anesthesia infrastructure in low income countries worldwide. Goals include expanding the Global Surgical Index, the Global Surgical Exchange and insuring safe anesthesia and the timely delivery of emergency and essential surgery in low income countries. All surgical activities are included within the scope of these goals including general, trauma, pediatrics, obstetrics, orthopedics, urologic, gynecologic, reconstructive and neurosurgery, anesthesiology, as well as acute and chronic pain management.

Supported activities include performing country based needs assessments, providing physical buildings and sterile operating spaces, equipment, consumable supplies and medications, as well as the education and training needed to build the healthcare workforce. Central to this effort is an awareness campaign to highlight the critical role of surgery within global health, along with fund raising to support advocacy efforts, as well as programs to ensure measurement of outcomes and effectiveness of the activities supported.



Global Surgical Index

Imagine having the ability to know exactly what surgical resource is needed in any number of developing markets. The power of this knowledge would be a game changer because it would empower the global medical community to know exactly what resources needed to be sent where to shift the global health paradigm forever. An index of global surgical needs could be easily coupled to a databank of resources capable of being deployed. This is a world changing idea!

The Global Surgical Consortium (GSC) is creating this world changing idea. It is being called the Global Surgical Index (GSI). Realizing that there is no single indicator that summarizes the comprehensive surgical needs in the developing world, the GSC intends to build one based on surveys in 85 developing nations. The GSI will have the power of any public health indicator – revealing need, resources and disability and death that result from the absence of basic surgery and safe anesthesia. The GSC will avail this index, the GSI, to any company, NGO, university, government, or individual who wants to deploy resources to address the needs identified in the GSI.

We know that 2 Billion people worldwide have no access to life saving emergency surgery, nor life changing essential surgery. Help us today bring the data to the world, so that industry, organizations and academic institutions can begin providing safe anesthesia and c-sections for mothers, hemorrhage surgery for those who have just delivered, trauma interventions for broken bones and cancer surgery for those with breast, cervical and testicular cancer which will save lives, and enable the young to continue to work and provide for their families.
